

Vestry Vibes by Douglas Burnett



Dear friends,

Easter is with us once again. For many the mention of Easter will mostly mean the prospect of a holiday. That is no bad thing. Especially after the past three years when the opportunity just to get away has been limited, the ability to get away is something to be warmly embraced.

Of course, the notion of holidays was always based in the notion of holy days. Before any notion of "getting a bit of a break" was ever thought of It was all part of the liturgical life of the church, and that certain holy days were always associated with certain aspects of the divine. For Roman Catholics such days are still in plenty and can be connected with particular saints. Each of those saints points to a certain characteristic or aspect of God. Holy days were always about broadening our horizons to see and understand new aspects of the world around us as being within the orbit of God. In the beginning and at the end, all is of God. As the Book of Revelation puts it, God is the Alpha and the Omega. Maybe getting away on holiday is very much about that need that we have as human beings to broaden our horizons and discover something new. Which brings me back to the understanding of the Easter holiday, or the Easter holy day. Nothing could be more fundamental to human beings than some real understanding of life and death.

Birth is obviously what we celebrate at Christmas. But understanding death and looking beyond our mortality is what we come to at Easter. That is a much tougher challenge all round. Maybe that is why many prefer to bypass Good Friday altogether. Understandably so. But even so, there it is. But then we move onto Easter Sunday. With Easter Sunday there is always, a feel, not only a real note of celebration (it is the holiest day in the Christian calendar), but also a real sense of relief. Maybe that is because Easter Sunday truly does broaden our horizons in a way that we thought was unimaginable. If you take Easter at all seriously, that is what it does. It is mind-blowing stuff. In fact, the way in which the gospel writers tell in in their writing it is almost as if they are saving. "Look, I know that this sounds crazy, but this is what we saw, heard and experienced." They had to create this utterly unique category that we still know as the resurrection. The life, death and resurrection of Christ is still. in my mind, the most compelling story in human history. If you can get away over Easter then that is very good. I hope that in some way that you can celebrate with family and friends. I hope that you can find a way to celebrate life. But do remember that at the heart of it all that some 2000 years ago that something remarkable and powerful happened that flowed from God. Because of that we can look forward with hope, faith and confidence. Christ is Risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Minutes of last meeting 18.1.23; Confirmed as accurate.

Matters Arising;

1. Warmbank.

This effective scheme has now closed. It generated limited take-up & therefore ran significantly under budget. Project will now extend into a weekly Wednesday Coffee morning from 10.30 am to 1.30pm in the Whiteladies Road vestibule, from Wednesday 3rd May. Great thanks to Derek for leading this initiative.

Finance & Property update:

Andrew Hayden, new Church Treasurer presented the report. The minutes of 18.9.22 indicated that Andrew would begin this role 1.1.23, but this was delayed, and confirmed today.

Key Points;

a. Expenditure continues to outstrip income, there remains £24,348 in the Bank accountit may be necessary to draw down additional funds from Reserves.

b. Major recent expenditure includes Manse Roof Repair (£13,000), Painting of rear stairwells, (£7,000), Necessary work for fire precaution compliance (c£30,000) & Hurle Road Club Rooms Flood Repairs (Insurance Claim, Church to pay & then reclaim). c. Gas and electricity expenditure has also increased.

d. Substitute heating will be required following the breakdown of the second boiler. e. 77th Scouts are seeking to take a 25 year lease on the Hurle Road Club Rooms, thereby relieving Redland Park of the work, risk and cost of premises, & offering us some regular income over the lease period, plus rooms to continue to be available for community use. Synod has been informed. The transfer to the Scouts is planned to be completed by 31.12.24

f. Church Meeting Resolution; in order to complete the emergency repairs to the Manse roof, Redland Park URC wish to apply for a Synod Grant of £1,290 for the roof & a Synod Eco Grant of £420. This resolution was proposed by Andrew Hayden and seconded by Carol Fry and unanimously agreed. The full application will be signed by Dougie, Les. & Andrew.

Enormous gratitude was expressed to John Neugebauer for his 14 years as Church Treasurer. In turn, John's report highlighted the enormous support offered by David & Viv Hayden and Sally & Terry King.

News of Members: The deaths of Andrew Sims & Elaine Savage were reported, as well as updates on 7 other members.

Ministerial Matters:

1. New Members; Upto 6 will be welcomed on Palm Sunday- 2nd April-

2. Bristol Korean Church will formally join the URC as a full member church at the July General Assembly.

Rev James Jang is supporting as a Companion Elder & Rev Johan Song is preaching with a view today. The BKC will vote on the appointment on 26.3.23. The appointment is subject to both an employment visa being granted & a manse being found.

3. Easter

Monday evening reflection at Redland Park. (Dougie), Tuesday at Cotham, Wednesday at Redland Park (Helena)- NOT at the Chaplaincy, Maundy Thursday at Tyndale Baptist &.Good Friday service at Victoria. Easter Sunday will be a joint service with BKC.

An Easter Service is planned for St John's School Reception classes.

Keeping up with the vicar Pt133 Angus Gregson

Here are the Lectionary readings for April and the first Sunday in May. As usual in the period between Easter and Pentecost, the Lectionary chooses a bit of Acts in place of the Old Testament reading.

The key to all these is in the last verse of our April 16th reading, John 20:31 which sets out the purpose of the gospel, just as Luke does in the first four verses of his account and Mark, with typical bluntness, does in just one verse, his first.

In our post resurrection readings from Acts, we see the launch of the church as the gospel spreads and the church grows rapidly beyond Jerusalem. We see how driven Peter and Paul (once he'd seen the light - literally) are to spread the gospel to both Jews and Gentiles as they live out what Paul calls "The Way". Have we got the same enthusiasm and drive for spreading the good news that has transformed our lives?

When I wrote this piece for the Recorder three years ago, churches in the UK had just suspended their services. How long did we think that would last? So I suggested then that maybe you could read the readings for each Sunday and work out what the sermon would have said. You can still do that now, just earlier in the week, and then play "sermon bingo" on Sunday. How many of your points did the preacher include, and vice versa? It'll mean listening carefully though...

Life-giving Faith Defiant Hope Generous Love

Producing resilient livestock

Gilbert Butau from Mudzi, Zimbabwe is a livestock farmer who contends daily with the realities of climate change and unpredictable weather conditions. Christian Aid partner BRACT has been working to help communities like Gilberts, to prepare and adapt to a changing climate and economic shocks.

BRACT have provided training in livestock management, worked to improve farmers access to animal feed, provided farmers with incubators for chicken farming and has introduced young male boer goats for breeding. The boer breed develops swiftly and has a high meat yield, increasing profitability. Its successful breeding programme has meant that other villages are now benefitting too. Gilbert says, "Each time I got male kids, I would pass on one of them to another farmer in the next village. In that way we are realising great success with the goat improvement programme."

When assessing the health of their cattle herds, farmers identified ticks as a major cause of sickness, low market value and animal death. BRACT, helped to support farmers to make financial contributions for buying dipping chemical for their herds. Gilbert says, "The BRACT program taught us self-reliance. As a community we raised our own money and procured cattle dipping chemicals... Ever since the start of the sustainable dipping initiative, we no longer have ticks, and our

cattle are now marketable. Our goats and cattle now fetch good market prices." Another farmer in the community, Kerry Mavandiva, says, "Before the BRACT project came, my oxen would fetch about \$250 or \$300 but now fetch about

'Our goats and cattle now fetch good market prices' \$500 to \$600 which means we now get better returns that go a long way in sustaining our families".

With these gains, the farmers like Gilbert can prioritise their family's own nutritional needs and bring to market their surplus.

COP27, like many UN conferences of the past left mixed feelings. Whilst there was a real lack of commitment to phase out fossil fuels, a deal was agreed to create a fund to compensate those most impacted by climate disasters. Joab Okanda, Christian Aid's Pan African Policy Advisor, said: "This is a victory for climate vulnerable countries who have been demanding this." Right now though, all we have is an empty bucket. We need those responsible for the climate crisis to step up and provide the money urgently needed to help communities on the frontlines of the crisis.
