

Vestry Vibes by Douglas Burnett



Dear friends.

So, how is it going for you? I am so aware that almost for the past 12 months we have been in much the same place. Lockdown. It does seems a bit like Groundhog Day, doesn't it? I am aware that I find myself drawn back to the issue on the pandemic time and time again. The point would be that we are all trying to make sense of it all. It will be an issue for many a school syllabus in the years to come. But in the meantime we try to make sense of it all while we are still living through it. That is where hope comes in. But, for the time being, we are waiting.

An American writer and minister that I know of expresses the idea of waiting in this way:

"A lot of life that is about waiting. Waiting until you're old enough to drive, or go off to college, or marry the love of your life, or....
You get the picture. The life of faith is something like that, too. Theologians are fond of saying we live in the "in-between" time of Christ's first coming and Christ's return.
Much, we pray, will be made right when Christ comes again. But that doesn't mean we don't have anything to do "in the meantime."
Whatever end awaits us, in the meantime we can care for those around us, have courage, share hope, love those around us, strive for what is best, and a whole host of other things.

But that can be hard. As W.H. Auden once wrote, the time being can be "the hardest time of all."

That reminds me of one of the great Christian books that revolves around this theme. It is "The Stature of Waiting" by W.H. Vanstone. Published in 1982 it explored the way in which we set great store by activity and busy-ness. We want to be 'in control'. We value what we 'do' more than who we are. So, when we become ill, or

retire from work, or suffer an enforced period of inactivity, our self-esteem is threatened. We evade, repudiate, or resent experiences of passivity, of waiting. This classic of spiritual writing transforms our understanding of the experiences of illness, or of being out of work, or feeling inactive and powerless. W. H. Vanstone shows us the unquestioned and impressive majesty of lesus as he 'waits' before those who accuse him, waits before those who taunt him and. finally, waits before even those who crucify him. It is in his passivity and 'passion', when we have things done to us instead of doing things, the times when we simply wait, are as important as the times of action and taking charge.

It struck me that maybe this aspect of our faith is something to reflect on at this time, as we all wait for the vaccine to be rolled out, and for ourselves to be "let" out of our homes and immediate localities. What is it that truly gives us value? There are some truly profound questions arising out of the experience of the past few years. Our faith tradition can help answer those questions.

By the way, it is now Lent. Lent is all about journeying in the wilderness and dealing with profound questions. The Churches Together in Clifton, Cotham and Redland Lent Conversations will deal with some of those. They will all be on-line this year. Be sure to join us!

About the charity - why toilets matter

- 2 billion people don't have somewhere safe and hygienic to go to the toilet. (WHO/ Unicef)
- The lack of a loo makes women and girls a target for sexual attack going to the toilet in the open, late at night.
- Almost 1,000 children die every day from preventable diseases linked to dirty water and unsafe toilets. (UN)
- 663 million people live without safe water. (Unicef)
- Children worldwide miss 443 million school days each year because of dirty water and poor sanitation. (UN)
- Every year, women and girls spend 97 billion hours finding a place to go. (World Bank)
- Nine hundred children die every day from disease linked to dirty washing and poor sanitation.
- In 47 countries less than half the population have a proper toilet.

We all know how important it is to have proper toilets and clean water but here are some reasons you may not have thought about:

- People are likely to become sick through sanitation-related diseases. Illness means they
 cannot work or farm their land, so they earn less or grow less food
- Girls often drop out of school altogether when they start their periods if there are no toilets or changing rooms
- Parents have to pay for medicines or food, so they may fall into debt
- Women and girls risk being attacked or bitten by snakes as they go to the toilet in the open, especially if the culture dictates that they have to go out at night

Dignity is restored when the whole family can use a private, hygienic toilet at their home and no longer have to squat in the bush.

The Charity works with local communities showing them the need for improved sanitation and help them make that change themselves. Water and sanitation projects enable families to build a toilet, have access to clean water, and to learn about hand washing and other hygiene principles.

They bring villagers together in workshops and encourage them to join action groups focused on issues that concern the community, such as farming. Slowly, sensitively, the partners encourage men to allow women to have a say in household decisions, often for the first time. Women carry the heavier burden in terms of collecting water and caring for the family, yet often have no voice.

Local people are involved in deciding on the design and materials to be used in latrine building. This means latrines are both appropriate and affordable.

People generally build their own latrine, and this means they are much more likely to continue to use it, and maintain it – ensuring the project is sustainable. It also encourages dignity and self-respect.

Overall, the average cost per household for a water and sanitation programme is about £60. Toilet Twinning funds the work of Tearfund who work with these communities.

When our Church decided to fundraise for this charity it was hoped we would raise enough to twin with each toilet on our premises, of which there were 8[?]. Mathematicians amongst you will have calculated that that comes to £480.

We have, in fact, so far raised £611.97. So well done all. The fundraising will go on, so please support any quizzes or other activities we may be able to do in the coming months.

Keeping up with the vicar Pt 111 Angus Gregson

Here are the Lectionary readings for February and the first Sunday in March. I don't know – barely out of Christmas and we're into Lent. But, as I type, sunset is over half an hour later than its earliest, and by the time you read this it'll be even later. The days are certainly LENgThening.

I went back to the bit I wrote 3 years ago to save having to type out all the readings again - the Lectionary readings follow a three year cycle. And I noticed that back in 2018 I offered a challenge with a prize if anyone could spot the one verb that features significantly in all three readings from Corinthians and in Peter's letter that are listed below.

Three years on I haven't had a single entry. Was it too hard a challenge? Or could noone be faffed to do it? Is anyone still reading by this point? I couldn't remember the answer myself so I've just looked at the readings again. Actually the answer is pretty obvious. Redland Park's church meeting was (again, as I type) an hour ago, and this key verb speaks powerfully to an issue Dougie raised there. What is it? More importantly, each of us needs to think "What am I doing about that?" What are we, what is our church doing about it? Lent is, after all, a time of preparation.

Many preachers use the lectionary readings as a basis for their preaching. The suggestion is to read them sometime in the week before Sunday worship so that if they are the ones used, it might help you get a bit more from the sermon.
